

Holbein Portrait Drawings (Dover Fine Art, History Of Art)

The slender volume of "Holbein Portrait Drawings" published by Dover books contains 44 portrait drawings by Hans Holbein (1497-1543). The pages are 8 by 11 inches. Unlike many collections of drawings (for example, those in the "Master Draughtsman" series) the captions of most drawings state their actual sizes. The reproductions in the book are somewhat smaller. For example, the portrait of the "Unknown Lady" that appears on the cover is said to be 281 x 192 mm. The reproduced image is roughly 222 x 151 mm. The images are monochrome. The original drawings are said to be done on pink paper with black and colored chalks. One can certainly find pink versions of the images on the web, but I haven't found any versions that documented their authenticity and it isn't clear whether the online versions are just monochrome images that have been digitally modified. Colors in digital photos can appear different on different computer monitors, so the question of what is an "authentic" reproduction is complex. Furthermore, as noted below, the book states that the original drawings have been "touched up" by people other than Holbein. Virtues and limitations of the book are given in the Publisher's Note and a note to the Publisher's Note.
